The Clue Catchers

Before Reading

1. How are graphic stories different from print stories? How are they the same?

Different: Are similar to a comic strip, use speech bubbles, graphics are a major part of the story, usually have a narrator.

Similar: Both tell a story, have the same elements.

During Reading

1. Think about the characters as you are reading. What visual clues (pictures, etc.) and text clues (what the characters say) does the author use to describe the characters?

Visual: Facial expressions, actions, clothes, interaction with other characters.

Text: What the characters say, what other characters say to them, what characters think.
