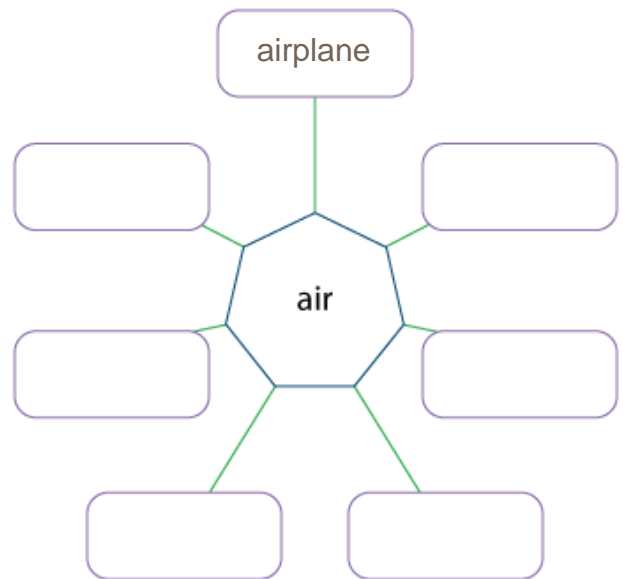
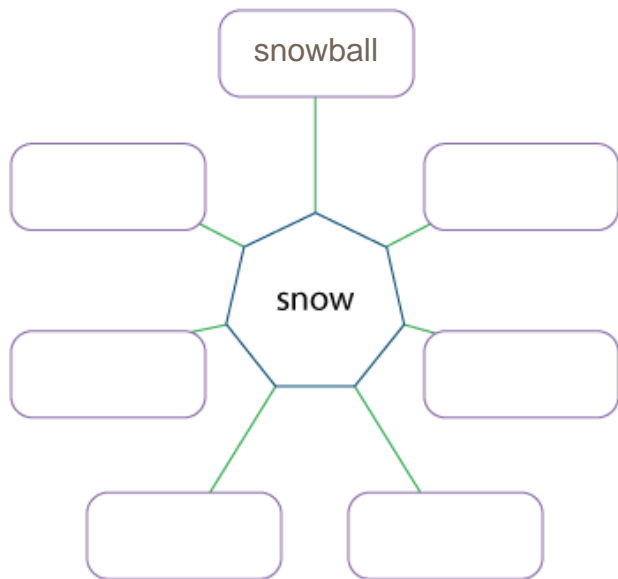
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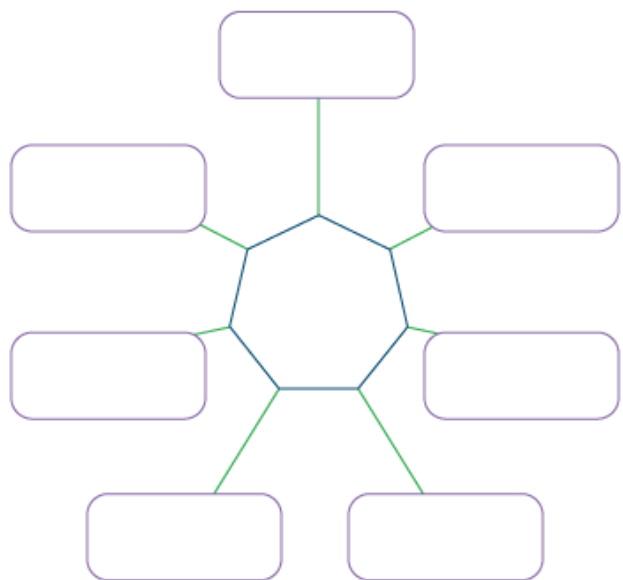
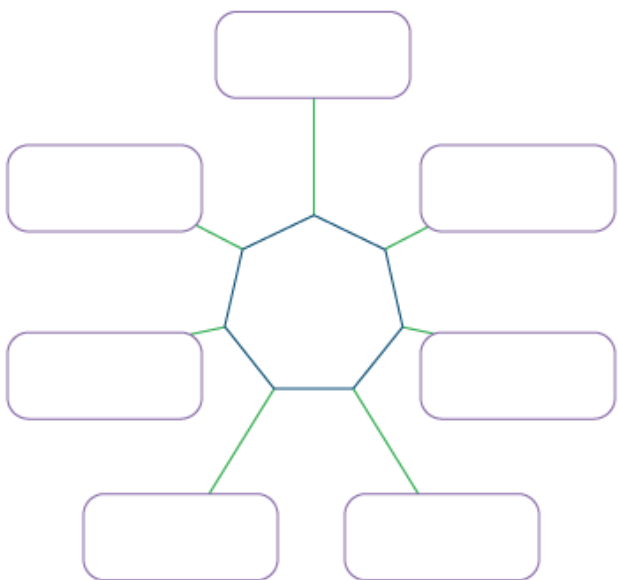
Compound Word Webs

Instructions

- In the top two boxes on the next page, use the root words given (snow and air), then add other words on the lines that can be joined to the root words to make compound words. For example: add **ball** to make **snowball**, or **plane** to make **airplane**.
- Make as many compound words as you can, using the words *snow* and *air*.
- For the first one, say "snow" to yourself. What can you add to snow to make a new word? How about "ball"? Right – that will make **snowball**. What other words can you think of to add to snow?
- Keep going, thinking up new words you can add to snow. Write each one in the blanks provided.
- For the next one, do the same with the word "air". What comes to mind when you say "air"? What about **airplane**? Can you think of others? Keep thinking of new words and writing them on the lines provided.
- For the empty webs at the bottom, try using "**in**" and "**same**" for the starter words.
- In the bottom two boxes, you will need to decide on a root word to start with as well.



Hint: There are at least seven possibilities for each web.
