

ASSIGNMENT III: PERSUASIVE WRITING IN CONTEXT

Suggested time: 40 to 50 minutes

Read the situation described below and use it to complete the assignment that follows.

The Situation

The Prosper High School administration is considering a proposal brought forward by the Parents' Advisory Council to adopt a school dress code. Supporters of the proposal express concern over student clothing choices that are frequently too revealing, inappropriate, or unsafe. Opponents of the proposal believe that a dress code would infringe on the rights of both students and their parents.

In deciding whether to accept the proposal, the Prosper High School administration has invited concerned individuals to make their views known. You are Quinn Whitley, a Grade 12 student at Prosper High School. You have considered information and opinions from a variety of sources (see pages 14 and 15). After considering the advantages and disadvantages of the proposal, you have reached a decision. You now need to write a persuasive speech or letter that clearly develops your position.

The Assignment

Write a speech or letter that will persuade the Prosper High School Administration either to **ACCEPT or **REJECT** the proposal to adopt a school dress code.**

In preparing your persuasive speech or letter, **BE SURE TO**

- study the information on pages 14 and 15
- consider your purpose and audience
- present a clear argument that explains the reasons behind your decision
- use an appropriate tone

Remember that you must clearly and directly choose either to **accept** or to **reject** the proposal.

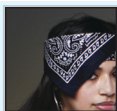
The Proposed School Dress Code will ban the Following:



Halter-tops, tube tops, off the shoulder tops, or low-cut tops of any kind



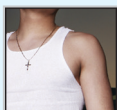
Extremely short shorts, skirts or dresses



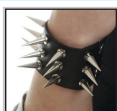

White sleeveless undershirts



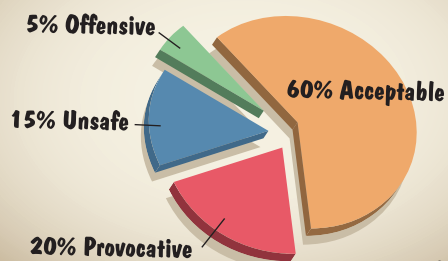
Chains, jewelry, shoes and other clothing with points or spikes



Bare midriffs

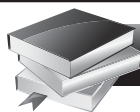
Students who do not comply with the Prosper school dress code must return home and change or a school T-shirt will be provided.

Student academic performance is more strongly linked to external factors than it is to cognitive ability. According to Dr. Sean Wells of the University of Western Canada, students are negatively influenced by the distractions of regular classroom settings.

"Conventional classrooms are filled with numerous distractions that are visual, auditory, and psychological in nature. When these distractions are reduced or removed, it becomes easier for students to focus on the material being studied."

Key findings of the study include:

- removing a single distraction improved concentration by 20%
- students in test groups with no distractions performed 30% higher on cognitive assessments
- psychological factors affecting student performance were hardest to control

Dear Prosper Highschool Administrators,

My name is Quinn Whitley, a grade 12 student of Prosper High School. I have heard your proposal to adopt a school dress code and I would like to tell you what my opinion about all of this. I humbly accept this idea.

Firstly, the students need to know where they are going and need to know how to properly dress for it. You can't go to school wearing the same clothes you could wear for a metal band concert. That's just not right. Sure, students may complain about not being able to express themselves because they're being forced to wear clothes that they don't like but it's for their own good. Like in the stranded bus incident, who would wear sleeveless shirts and short shorts in that kind of weather? They will go out to society wearing suits and ties anyway, so why not start dressing appropriately now?

Secondly, the learning atmosphere in the classroom will improve if there are fewer distractions. Students will concentrate more on the lesson than looking at other students' distracting clothes. Some students may also talk to others that they couldn't talk before because of their imposing clothes. They may even gain even more friends by wearing more acceptable clothes than before.

Lastly, about the events that require students to wear certain clothing. Those could be allowed due to it being a school event and happens just once in a schoolyear. Of course, they are allowed to wear anything they wish, it just have to fit in with the criteria of the event. If it's a beach wear event, they're supposed to wear clothes for the beach; if it's a sweater contest, only sweaters are allowed, that sort of thing.

Dear Prosper High School Administration,

My name is Quinn Whitley and I am a grade 12 student at Prosper High School. I am writing this letter to discuss the matter of whether to bring in a student dress code or not. I will be advocating on the side of not bringing in a dress code. Dress codes are things that should be reserved for private schools. They take away from the individuality of the students and freedom of expression. It also creates an environment of high stress and conformity, as well as causing the students to buy new clothes to fit into the dress code that they might not be able to afford.

A dress code for our high school is a bad idea. Students like to dress in ways that express who they are. Some dress in the fashion that is considered cool or others like to represent their culture in what they wear. With the implementation of a dress code the freedom of expression would be removed from the students. Only a small percentage of students actually dress in what is considered as "crude or vulgar" dress wear. You should not take the actions of a few and punish everyone. That is discrimination. If you only punish the people who are going overboard in what they wear in trying to either show too much skin or vulgar and profane things then punish them. Let everyone else dress like regular people and express who they are through what they wear.

Although bringing in a dress code seems like a good idea it can cause many issues. Not all students and their families have extra cash to burn. Some families are already very stressed in where and how they are going to get the bills paid on time. Implementing a dress code would burden them with more stress because they would need to purchase new clothing to fit the standards of said dress code. Also fun activities like the "Beach Bash," where students go to bond and play and have a good

time would be removed. They wouldn't be allowed to dress in their beach attire and just go to a school activity to have fun with their friends because of the dress code.

Although some studies show that taking away distractions such as outside appearances and how we dress improve our cognitive abilities and academics these studies are often very biased. They select people from a small group of people that will help their study get better results. The principal from Rolling Hills` even states that the introduced uniform policy did not work the way it should have. Even with the dress code the provincial test results and high school completion rates did not improve. Most parents agree that is okay what the students are wearing and there is no need for a school dress code.

Although we understand that implementing a school dress code may seem like a good idea, it would cause a lot more unrest then solving the problems. The real problem is only a small percent of the students who need to be treated according to what they do. Instead of solving the actual problem it would only create more and would cause students to lose identity because they can't express who they are through the clothing they wear.
