Your Exam Two Final is based on the content you learned in Units 2 and 3 only. Unit 1 material is not included, with the exception that you should review your materials about theme, as you need to understand theme to complete the Literary Exploration Essay. This exam is worth 15% of your final mark.

You must to bring your **Sightlines 10** textbook, and you are encouraged to bring a dictionary, thesaurus, and writer's handbook to the exam. **Reading and Writing for Success** is not on the approved list.
