PERSONAL RESPONSE TO TEXT ASSIGNMENT

(suggested time: 45 minutes)

Carefully read and consider the texts below and complete the assignment that follows.

The poem that begins J. R. R. Tolkien's The Lord of the Rings

Three Rings for the Elven-kings under the sky,
Seven for the Dwarf-lords in their halls of stone,
Nine for Mortal Men doomed to die,
One for the Dark Lord on his dark throne
In the Land of Mordor where the Shadows lie.
One Ring to rule them all, One Ring to find them,
One Ring to bring them all and in the darkness bind them
In the Land of Mordor where the Shadows lie.

Representatives of Elves, Dwarves, and Men gather in Rivendell for the Council of Elrond. At stake is the fate of the One Ring, made by the Dark Lord Sauron and lost for ages until found by the hobbit Bilbo Baggins. Now in the keeping of Bilbo's nephew Frodo, the Ring is sought relentlessly by Sauron as the dark clouds of war gather over the free peoples of Middle Earth.

Now I shall have to alter that: it does not look like coming true; and anyway there will evidently have to be several more chapters, if I live to write them. It is a frightful nuisance. When ought I to start?"

Boromir looked in surprise at Bilbo, but the laughter died on his lips when he saw that all the others regarded the old hobbit with grave respect. Only Glóin smiled, but his smile came from old memories.

"Of course, my dear Bilbo," said Gandalf. "If you had really started this affair, you might be expected to finish it. But you know well enough now that *starting* is too great a claim for any, and that only a small part is played in great deeds by any hero. You need not bow! Though the word was meant, and we do not doubt that under jest you are making a valiant offer. But one beyond your strength, Bilbo. You cannot take this thing back. It has passed on. If you need my advice any longer, I should say that your part is ended, unless as a recorder. Finish your book, and leave the ending unaltered! There is still hope for it. But get ready to write a sequel, when they come back."

Bilbo laughed. "I have never known you give me pleasant advice before," he said. "As all your unpleasant advice has been good, I wonder if this advice is not bad. Still, I don't suppose I have the strength or luck left to deal with the Ring. It has grown, and I have not. But tell me: what do you mean by they?"

"The messengers who are sent with the Ring."

"Exactly! And who are they to be? That seems to me what this Council has to decide, and all that it has to decide. Elves may thrive on speech alone, and Dwarves endure great weariness; but I am only an old hobbit, and I miss my meal at noon. Can't you think of some names now? Or put it off till after dinner?"

No one answered. The noon-bell rang. Still no one spoke. Frodo glanced at all the faces, but they were not turned to him. All the Council sat with downcast eyes, as if in deep thought. A great dread fell on him, as if he was awaiting the pronouncement of some doom that he had long foreseen and vainly hoped might after all never be spoken. An overwhelming longing to rest and remain at peace by Bilbo's side in Rivendell filled all his heart. At last with an effort he spoke, and wondered to hear his own words, as if some other will was using his small voice.

"I will take the Ring," he said, "though I do not know the way."

I have climbed the highest mountains I have run through the fields Only to be with you Only to be with you


I have run I have crawled

Section I: Personal Response to Text Assignment

(Suggested time: approximately 45 minutes)

The Assignment

The excerpt from *Lord of the Rings* suggests that one may be willing to persevere, even in the midst of great difficulty. The photo "Refusing to be down in the dumps", presents children carrying on happily, in less than ideal circumstances. In the song lyrics, "I Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For", Bono expresses how his quest for further fulfillment and faith persists, despite seemingly continuous setbacks. Lance Armstrong's unprecedented seven Tour de France victories illustrates the impact that perseverance can have on our ability to overcome obstacles.

What do these texts suggest to you about the effect of perseverance? Support your ideas with reference to <u>ONE</u> of the texts presented and to your previous knowledge and/or experience.

Instructions

- You may respond from a personal, critical, and/or creative perspective.
- Support your response with reference to the text and/or to your own ideas and/or experiences.
- Select a prose form that is appropriate to what you wish to communicate and that will effectively communicate to the reader.
- Choose a planning strategy that is effective for you.
- **Discuss** ideas and/or impressions that are *meaningful to you*.
- Consider how you can create a strong unifying effect.

Section II: Literary Essay Assignment

(Suggested time: approximately 1½ to 2 hours)

Reflect on the ideas and impressions that you discussed in the Personal Response to Text Assignment regarding the effect of perseverance.

The Assignment

Much literature examines the individual's capacity to persevere in the face of hardship or the unknown.

Write a literary essay based on a text you have studied that examines the effect of perseverance in people's lives.

What idea does the author develop regarding the effect of perseverance?

Support and develop your controlling idea with reference to specific details from the text you choose to discuss.

Reminders for planning and writing

- **Select** a literary text that is relevant to this assignment and interesting to you from the short stories, film, novel, non-fiction, plays, poetry, and other texts that you have studied in ELA 10-1 this semester. **You should be very familiar with the text you choose to discuss.**
- You must focus your discussion on a text other than the texts provided in this examination booklet.
- Carefully consider your controlling idea or how you will create a strong unifying effect in your composition. Organize your composition so that your ideas are clearly, effectively, and coherently presented.
- As you develop your ideas, support them with appropriate, relevant, and meaningful examples from the literary text.
