Section A – Observational Drawing:

- Using your hand as a model, draw your hand in the entire space below.

- Pay attention to the different shapes of lines, textures, spaces and shadows on your hand. Remember to apply the modelled drawing techniques.

To achieve a score of 10 marks for Section A, the student must meet the following criteria:

- **Content:** The drawing of the student's hand is expressive and imaginative, and fulfils the requirements of the assignment instructions.
- **Creativity:** The artwork is innovative and original.
- **Craftsmanship:** The artwork reflects deliberate control of media and quality craftsmanship. The student shows an awareness of filling the space adequately to create a unified composition.



Section B - Colour Theory I – Colour Wheel:

- Using coloured pencils or paint, complete the following colour wheel to include the 3 Primary Colours, the 3 Secondary Colours & the 6 Tertiary Colours.
- Start with the primary colours, then the secondary colours and then the tertiary colours (hint: there should be 3 sections in between each primary colour).
- To create the colours of the secondary colours, you should mix the appropriate primary colours. To create the tertiary colours, you should mix the related primary and secondary colours.
- Once you have coloured in each section, you also must label your colour wheel, to include the primary, secondary & tertiary labels and the corresponding names of the colours.


To achieve a score of 10 marks for Section B, the student must complete the colour wheel as follows, according to the above outlined requirements:



Section C: Colour Theory II - Complementary Colours:

Section D: Colour Theory III - Value – Tints:


• Using the following example value scale as a reference, use paint or coloured pencils to create the indicated value scales.


Example Value Scale – Black to White

Section E - Expressive Cartoons:



To achieve a score of 10 marks for Section E, the student must complete the following frames as outlined in the assignment instructions:



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Section F – Advertising Poster:

- Choose an upcoming local event (real or imaginary) in your community (concert, play, exhibition, venue, contest, etc.)
- Your poster should include a Title (What is your poster advertising?), a Date (When is the event taking place?) and Location (Where is the event?) and any other necessary miscellaneous information like who is putting on the event and, if applicable, what entry fees are involved, etc. You may use any media of your choice.
- Include imagery (drawings) that relates to the subject matter advertised on your poster.

To achieve a score of 10 marks for Section F, the student must meet the following criteria:

- **Content:** The artwork(s) is expressive and imaginative, and fulfils the requirements of the assignment instructions.
- **Creativity:** The artwork is innovative, original, well thought out, and thoroughly developed.
- **Composition:** The artwork demonstrates an excellent understanding of composition incorporating, when necessary, several of the design elements and principals (line, shape, colour, balance, contrast, harmony, emphasis, movement, proportion, pattern, variety, unity, rhythm, repetition).
- **Craftsmanship:** The artwork reflects deliberate control of media and quality craftsmanship. The student shows an awareness of filling the space adequately to create a unified composition.


Section G – Surrealist Landscape:

- Using coloured pencils or paint, create a surrealist (i.e. fantasy/dream-like/bizarre) landscape (outdoor scene).
- You composition should include surrealist elements, as well as texture, dimension and perspective. Use the entire space provided below.
- You may compose your drawing by turning the page sideways.






Section H – Format Adaptation:

To achieve a score of 10 marks for Section H, the student must complete the following formats as outlined in the assignment instructions:



Section I – Self-Portrait:

- Using coloured pencils, felt pens, paint, and/or oil pastels, create a composition of your self-portrait (your own face).
- Use the entire space below. You may wish to sketch your portrait in pencil first, or you may just directly colour in your composition.
- Remember to include as many details as possible that reflect how you think you look like. Also remember to include the effects of texture, shadows and dimension.

To achieve a score of 10 marks for Section I, the student must meet the following criteria:

- **Content:** The artwork(s) is expressive and imaginative, and fulfils the requirements of the assignment instructions.
- **Creativity:** The artwork is innovative, original, well thought out, and thoroughly developed.
- **Composition:** The artwork demonstrates an excellent understanding of composition incorporating, when necessary, several of the design elements and principals (line, shape, colour, balance, contrast, harmony, emphasis, movement, proportion, pattern, variety, unity, rhythm, repetition).
