Consequences of Immigration Chart

Immigration has many consequences, both as benefits and costs. Consider the push and pull factors present in each of the success stories you read.

For each of the success stories you read, determine the consequences (benefits and costs) for the immigrant and for Canada in the chart below. The first row of the chart has been completed as an example. Type your responses between the blue brackets provided.

- Consider the benefits and costs for the **individual** — Take into account factors such as where the individual came from, what he or she had to do to get to Canada, and what he or she experienced after arriving in Canada.
- Consider the benefits and costs for **Canada** — Take into account factors such as how the nation has benefitted and what changes have had to occur because of this experience.
