A storyboard is a series of sketches, drawings or photographs used to plan and prepare for filming.

Storyboards...

- generally save time
- · enable you to improve and receive feedback on ideas
- give you an idea of how many cameras and camera angles you will need
- help with continuity (the flow of the film)
- bring your ideas to reality

You may use stick figures. Story boards are a guide. Storyboard significant changes in actions and locations. You will need captions.

Consider the following:

- What setting will you choose for your scene?
- How many actors are needed in the shot?
- Do you need any important or large props?
- What types of shots will you use?
- Do you need any camera movement to add motion to each shot? In other words, does the camera follow the actor in each shot, and if so, in what direction?
- Do you need special lighting? The lighting is important to the type of mood you
 want to convey (for example, you may need candlelight, moonlight, a dark alley,
 or a bright sunny day).
