





Features of Novels

Front Cover

 includes the title of the story and the author's name, may include an image that represents the story

Dedication

 a short message written by the author dedicating the book to someone or something; dedications are usually presented at the beginning of the book and sometimes appear on a separate page

Example: J.K. Rowling wrote this dedication in the last Harry Potter book, Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows: "The dedication of this book is split seven ways: to Neil, to Jessica, to David, to Kenzie, to Di, to Anne, and to you, if you have stuck with Harry until the very end."

Acknowledgements

- An acknowledgement page contains the author's thank you to those people who have provided assistance or support in the writing of the story.
- Authors may thank their publisher, editor, sources, illustrators, and/or their family members - whomever as the story was being written.

Prologue

• A prologue is an introduction to a story that provides some details about events that have taken place in the past or details about the characters in the novel.

Special Features

- Some novels contain more than the written words. You may find illustrations or pictures, glossaries, maps, timelines, or family trees.
- These special features may be placed at the beginning or end of the book, or are scattered throughout the story.

Note: If the novel you chose does not have a particular feature, include a sentence that explains this. (Example: *The book I have chosen does not include a prologue.*)
