EQ: What drives our need to belong?

Please note that Rose uses an EQ not found in your ELA 30-1 course. Also note that Rose included a bibliography, which is called Works Cited when MLA formatting is used.

When I look at <u>The Shape of a Girl</u>, I think about this essential question the most. I think people either participate in bullying or act as bystanders for a few reasons. I think they are bystanders, because they don't want to be bullied themselves. A person might think, "It is easier to go along with someone who seems strong than to question that person and risk being hurt." What people don't realize is that just going along with a bully only makes that bully stronger. The other reason I think people go along with bullies is the need for acceptance. They would rather be a part of a group than to be an outsider?

On the positive side, I think that people who are concerned about bullying connect with each other, easier than in the past, because of social media, like Twitter, blogs, websites, and other online forums. Even famous people are speaking out against bullying hopes that their voices will be heard and respected.

I have looked for online sources that talk about these reasons for belonging, and I found quite a few good examples.

HazingPrevention.org is a post-secondary group that is working hard to get rid of hazing. They define hazing as "any action taken or situation created intentionally that causes embarrassment, harassment or ridicule, [that] risks emotional and/or physical harm to members of an group or team, whether new or not, regardless of the person's willingness to participate" (HazingPrevention.org, 2011).

It is often done by groups of people, like on teams and in fraternities. I snooped around their tweets, and I found lots of students and professors talking about how much people will endure just to belong.

I know it seems weird to follow a T.V. show for information about bullying, but Extreme Makeover: Home Edition televised a show, after they decided to build a home for a family that had suffered a tragic loss. Their 11 year old son committed suicide in the top floor of their home, while the rest were downstairs. He was bullied in school. Even though he was really smart, he couldn't cope with what was happening to him. This is so wrong! The family dedicated their energy to try change how people think about bullying in schools.

The show started a website that asked people to make a simple pledge to combat bullying. You can find the pledge on http://register.standtogether.tv. Here's what happened when I worked on this assignment over the weekend:

Friday afternoon: Wow. I made a pledge to this website, and I was number 17, 071. In the few minutes it took me to write this blurb, 12 other people made pledges. Pledging might encourage kids who are getting bullied to stand up for themselves safely.

Friday night: Okay, I watched the show and saw them talking about how people can gain strength by connecting with others. They suggested that a sense of belonging can help people overcome their struggles.

Monday morning: Now, I am editing my assignment, three days later, and the number of pledges on their website has jumped to 92 72!! I really hope schools make these pledges something the people talk about, so it is out in the open. Kids should feel safe in school.

This is a cool thing to do! I like this idea very much! I will bookmark this website to see how many more pledges have been made!
